#### The Value of USPS

Perhaps we are intellectually curious about celestial navigation, even though we may never venture beyond sight of our own dock or marina. The prospect of discounts on marine products or services may be appealing.

After we have belonged to USPS for a while we come to appreciate the camaraderie of

others who share our enjoyment of the wonderful pastime of boating.

Initially then, the value proposition of our USPS membership is clearly positive. But what about later on, after we have taken all the courses we are interested in? Perhaps we get older, or develop new interests, and aren't as active in boating as we used to be. Maybe it gets harder to justify the cost of those annual dues.

That's when the public value of USPS becomes important. Public value refers to the benefit that our programs and activities have for the public at large - those who haven't taken our courses, aren't members, and may have never even heard of the organization.

For example, when USPS programs result in safer waterways, everyone benefits from the reduced risk to lives and property. Insurance premiums are lowered, and first responders aren't put in harm's way as often. If new boaters develop confidence on the water, they are more likely to stay active, and more active boaters (and voter/taxpayers) means greater support for the

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programs and infrastructure that support boating, which benefits everyone.

So even if the <u>personal</u> value of USPS membership becomes less important over time, the <u>public</u> value of our support for the organization remains.

Having enjoyed the direct benefits of belonging to the organization, we also have an obligation to give back as we are able, minimally through our dues, but hopefully also through involvement as instructors and volunteers.

But the times that we did make it to the lake, it was reassuring to know that the boating community at the Village Marina, whether affiliated with Seneca Sail and Power or Finger Lakes Yacht Club or just free lance, whether power or sail, that community is an incredibly friendly bunch and always ready to help. From our first year we were on Pier 1, the second year on Pier 2 and this year on Pier 3 and we've always been received well, made friends and had a good time just stopping and chatting along the way.

As fall comes we can look forward to some great

days on beautiful Seneca Lake and all the color that paints the hills. We also have to start thinking about haul-out and winter preparation. Keep an eye on the dates stamped on your safety equipment and make a plan to replace them over the winter. Take a close look at the running rigging, for chafing in places that may have been hidden or out of sight all summer long. And check the standing rigging closely where it comes through the deck. Are there any leaks apparent, or stress fractures that weren't there earlier? Are there any fish-hooks in the rig? Also look for any signs of wear or tearing where the shrouds attach to the mast or the spreader arms. Have any cleats worked loose, because they become a source of leaks as the holes elongate. How about motor mounts, especially in older boats, and look for unusual signs of wear around engine compartments, or on transoms. It's a good time to take stock of the physical condition of our boats. Our safety depends on it, for all of us.

#### Seamanship

A course which takes subjects mentioned in the ABC class and covers them in greater detail along with providing practical, hands-on, on-the-water instruction and experience.

- Prerequisites: None.
- When: Fridays during May-June 2014
- Duration: 9 weeks
- Where: Big Flats Community Center & Watkins Glen Village Marina
- Instructors: Tom Alley & Others
- Cost: \$90 (\$46 add'1)

#### **Junior Navigation**

The third of four navigation classes. This class will prepare you to cross oceans. While still utilizing GPS, the JN class provides the fundamentals of celestial navigation and shows you how to obtain your position utilizing the sun.

This course requires classroom work as well as fieldwork during which you will collect celestial observations needed to complete the course. The squadron will provide sextants if you do not have one.

#### **Piloting**

The first course in a series of four dedicated to the art and science of navigation. Piloting is the introductory course to inland and near-coastal navigation. The assumption is that GPS will be the primary tool used, but completion of this course will also provide you with a working knowledge of traditional navigational techniques that will get you home if (when) your electronics fail.

#### Advanced Piloting

The second course in a series of four dedicated to the art and science of navigation. As before, GPS is assumed to be the primary tools but traditional navigational skills are honed to meet the demands of coastal environments.

These ultra-portable devices offer capabilities not even dreamed of a decade ago and are finding an increasing number of applications in all facets of our lives, including boating.

#### Remote Desktop

During the Squadron's recent GPS on-the-water event, I was testing a newly commissioned GPS that interfaced with my laptop and the navigation software I have installed on it. While everything worked great, it was apparent that I really needed something in the cockpit that I could refer to while underway. I was also somewhat reluctant to mount my laptop where the elements could get to it. Fortunately, there is a solution!

Since I also have an iPad, it is possible to get an app that will allow the iPad to be used as a remote desktop for the laptop. There are multiple apps available to do this for both Windows and Macintosh, as well as apps that run

on iOS and Android tables or phones.

The result, my laptop is safe in the cabin from sun, spray, stray feet or flying winch handles while I can still see the navigation chart on my iPad while at the helm.

One note: The iPad has some magnets in it, so don't mount it too close to your compass or autopilot!

#### Knots 3D

Choose from 87 different knots and see how they're tied in incredible detail. Watch the knot draw itself



and pause the animation to see where the virtual rope goes in and out and around. (Something about a rabbit and a hole and a tree right?) Zoom in on the knot to get a closer look or flip it around for another perspective. Can your old school knot app do that?!

Each 3D knot has detailed information including tying pointers, strength and reliability, structural info, and Ashley reference numbers (ABoK) and occasionally the history behind the knot. Knots are listed with their common synonyms or localized equivalents.
